

GETTING AFLOAT ON THE BROADS

The NSBA and its affiliates (contact details are shown on pages 10-15) exist to promote boating on the Broads and to encourage more people to participate. There are many boating activities available including:

- opportunities for people of any age to try sailing at the open days of: Beccles Amateur Sailing Club (BASC), Broads One-Design Club (BODC), Coldham Hall Sailing Club (CHSC), Hickling Broad Sailing Club (HBSC), Hickling Windsurfing Club (HWC), Horning Sailing Club (HSC), Norfolk Broads Yacht Club (NBYC), Norfolk Schools Sailing Association (NSSA), Rollesby Broad Sailing Club (RBSC) and Royal Norfolk & Suffolk Yacht Club (RNSYC). (Open day dates are listed on pages 57-61.)
- opportunities to charter or day-hire a skippered historic Broads Wherry with: Norfolk Wherry Trust (NWT), Wherry Maud Trust (WMT) and Wherry Yacht Charter Charitable Trust (WYCCT), to enjoy a sail on the 100-year old Lowestoft smack of The Excelsior Trust (TET), to join a skippered traditional Broads yacht provided by Norfolk Heritage Fleet Trust (NHFT) or, if you have sufficient experience, even to helm some of these boats
- you can also take part in a training cruise aboard a Green Wyvern Yachting Club (GWYC) traditional broads yacht or The Excelsior Trust's (TET) smack.

We're lucky to have this unique nature of sailing on the Broads and surrounding areas.

Our clubs welcome anyone interested to come along and participate, and you don't even need to own a boat. You can enjoy:

- casual sailing, cruising, regular racing and social opportunities with many of our affiliates
- volunteering in the heritage vessels of the Norfolk Heritage Fleet Trust (NHFT), Norfolk Wherry Trust (NWT), Wherry Maud Trust (WMT) and Wherry Yacht Charter Charitable Trust (WYCCT), or in the Sailability centres of Nancy Oldfield Trust (NOT), Waveney Sailability Ltd (WSL) and Waveney Stardust Trust Ltd (WSTL)
- training for adults and juniors – most clubs possess their own training boats.

Two clubs sail only in the winter – Norwich Frostbite Sailing Club (NFSC) on the River Yare and Snowflake Sailing Club (SFSC) on the River Bure. Another two sail throughout the year – Rollesby Broad Sailing Club (RBSC) and Waveney & Oulton Broad Yacht Club (WOBYC) – both on broads. Most of our sailing clubs start activities in April and continue until October; some quite as far as Christmas or the new year.



Recognised Club

As the sailing programmes in this book indicate (pages 25-55), many NSBA affiliates are committed to training and have RYA Recognised Training Centre status. They give training in general seamanship as well as helming sailing dinghies, keelboats and powerboats. Contact Barton Turf Adventure Centre (BTAC), Green Wyvern Yachting Club (GWYC), Hickling Broad Sailing Club (HBSC), Horning Sailing Club (HSC), Norfolk Broads Yacht Club (NBYC) and Norfolk Schools Sailing Association (NSSA), (the latter three are *also* British Youth Sailing Recognised Clubs), Norfolk Heritage Fleet Trust (NHFT), Nancy Oldfield Trust (NOT), Norfolk Punt Club (NPC), Royal Norfolk & Suffolk Yacht Club (RNSYC), The Excelsior Trust (TET) and Waveney & Oulton Broad Yacht Club (WOBYC) – or Hickling Windsurfing Club (HWC) for windsurfing.

Two commercial training centres offering a variety of boating courses are: Whittingham Adventure Centre (NR14 8TR, 01603 632307) and Oulton Broad Water Sports Centre (NR33 9JR, 01502 558487). Both are part of the RYA OnBoard scheme.



Some of our clubs – Horning Sailing Club (HSC), Nancy Oldfield Trust (NOT) and Waveney Sailability Ltd (WSL) – are recognised by the RYA as specialists in delivering boating opportunities, with specially adapted boats, for those who might otherwise find it difficult to get on the water. Waveney Sailability Ltd (WSL) can even provide racing opportunities at Waveney & Oulton Broad Yacht Club (WOBYC) and elsewhere. Waveney Stardust Trust Ltd's (WSTL) passenger boats provide similar access.

The scheme provides opportunities for young people not already associated with a sailing club to benefit from RYA Training Centre activities.

NSBA OnBoard clubs are Horning Sailing Club (HSC), Norfolk Punt Club (NPC) and Norfolk Schools Sailing Association (NSSA).

The Broads is unique in the range and number of boats available for daily or weekly hire. You can hire a canoe, kayak, SUP, rowing boat, day boat, powerboat or sailing craft (large or small), even a wingsail. Examples of all these can be found amongst our advertisers, including Colin Buttifant, Hunter's Yard, Museum of the Broads, Phoenix Fleet and Sail & Power Boat Training Ltd. Eastwood Whelpton will even provide hire yachts of different rigs, sizes, ages and handicaps to enable you to participate in the annual *Barton Charter Yacht Regatta* (7-14 October).

The historians amongst you will be excited to know the Broads offer events that trace their origins back to the 19th century; several very well-kept and still competitive craft do indeed date back to pre-1900. Two of the local boat classes began over a century ago and are still running class races.

Most of the Broads regattas can be viewed from the shore or bankside; the programmes are included on pages 69-82.

Long-distance sailing races take place involving special skills and teamwork where bridges and tides are involved. See the **Open Meetings (Fixtures)** list on pages 57-61 for the dates of open days, races and regattas.

'Open Meeting' is an invitation for existing boat owners of specified Classes to race.

'Open Day' is for general public introduction to activities on offer, and to visit the club.
